Whilst it is not possible to organise any group until after lockdown maybe you can help when out on your daily exercise and if you see rubbish and it is safe to do so, pick it up.




Bonfires

Following the recent fire caused by a spark from a bonfire, Llangynog Community Council ask that you please do not light any fires in any part of the village and surrounding areas during any dry periods and especially not during this lockdown.

Mid Wales Fire and Rescue Service urge people in the county not to be tempted to burn garden or household waste.

Fires in the open are a drain on their resources. Please think about the consequences of such fires – now is not the time to be burning or starting fires in the open as they can quickly spread out of control, especially in dry weather.

These fires not only put our firefighters at risk unnecessarily but the smoke from such grass fires can cause breathing problems and

Potholes

LCC have raised the poor condition of the roads directly with highways and also Bryn Davies, our local PCC councillor. As road repairs are considered essential maintenance, Powys County Council (PCC) are continuing to repair roads and are planning to fix the potholes in the Pennant Valley loop soon. We have also registered the poor repair on the Bala Road. If you know of any other potholes of concern, please register them on the PCC website or contact Rhian who is able to raise them.

Update on the Bridge

As well as the recent damage to the bridge coming into the village, it has been identified that the listed bridge needs to be strengthened. LCC have asked PCC to discuss dates when the bridge will need to be closed to try to ensure that there is plenty of warning for road users and that disruption is kept to a minimum.



Dog Mess

This is an issue that continues to cause problems with all towns and villages. A number of residents have raised the issue of dog mess around the village and on footpaths. Please can LCC remind you to pick-up after your dog and dispose of it in an appropriate bin.

There has also been dog mess around

the St Melangell Churchyard. Dogs are allowed up the path on a lead as the church have a right of way and welcome dogs to the church. Again, please pick-up any mess. Dogs are not allowed on any other part of the churchyard.

Dog mess is not pleasant in any place, particularly by loved ones' graves and can be especially harmful for children and other animals.

Sunflowers and Scarecrows

Something that we can all get involved with. In the coming week or so you will receive a couple of giant sunflower seeds (waiting for delivery!) which you can plant in your gardens. Plant them at the front of the house to grow, so we can all see them develop over the coming months as we go about our daily exercise. At the same time make a scarecrow, or two! Again, leave it at the front of the house for all to see. It can be any type of scarecrow, made from any materials you have. At the end of all this, we would like to select an area where we can put all the scarecrows for us all to see.

Liangynog Playground

As you may be aware, a Playground Committee has been formed and is busy fundraising to improve the existing playground to encourage the facility to become a meeting space for children, their friends and families. It is also hoped to have some outdoor exercise equipment which adults can use as well.
